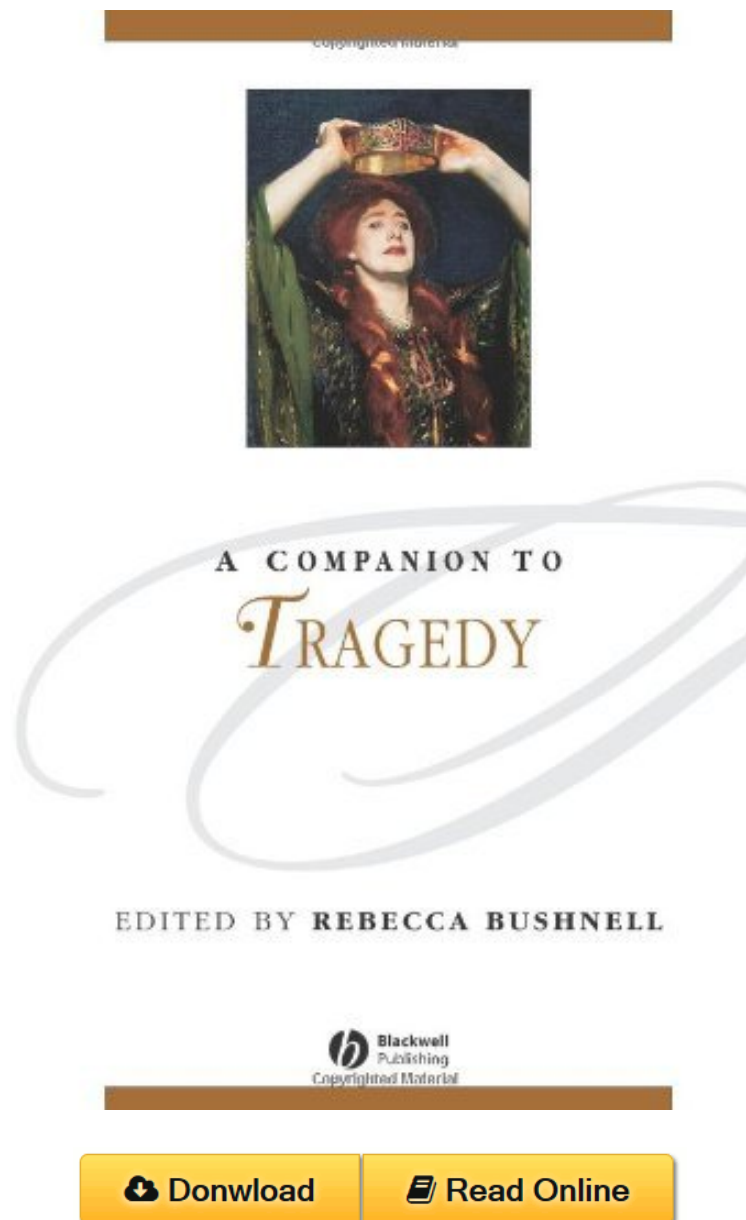

I've been using it as a guide in my study of tragedy and the chapters have proven reliable and judicious, particularly the ones on theories of tragedy. The editorial effort is impressive. I would have liked greater uniformity in the bibliographies--some are commented, some are not. I

personally prefer them to be commented. I think it serves better the purpose of a companion volume. The one thing I find objectionable is the Anglocentrism (but I must admit that in this volume, it isn't nearly as bad as it usually is even in the most serious scholarly volumes). To take an example, there are three chapters dedicated to English Renaissance tragedy and none to neo-Latin and Italian Renaissance tragedy. The true cultural center in the Renaissance was Italy, not England, no matter what Hollywood will have us believe, therefore it is basically silly to do away with the neo-Latin and Italian models for European tragedies, including those of Shakespeare.
