My perspective is someone who bought a large mixer and needed to learn more about how to use it. I read through this book pretty quickly and it was somewhat helpful but I was still pretty lost and wasn't able to make any decisions. However, then I read Mixing Audio, Second Edition: Concepts, Practices and Tools by Roey Izhaki, specifically the chapter on "Mixing Consoles". At the end of the chapter, I understood far more than I had from "Basic Mixers" and pretty comprehensively knew how to setup my mixer (and that was one chapter!). So although this is a credible little book, I would only buy it if you were dirt broke and wanted to be informed, but not necessarily educated about mixing. Otherwise, I can't say enough
