

This book is also definitely trying to sell stuff. Lots of stuff. Along with all the ads for "6 Handbags you NEED to own," it's annoyingly full of pronouncements such as, "The Berlin woman never wears brightly colored socks." "The Berlin woman would never get plastic surgery." (Helps of course if you're a young model,) and if you go to a "hip neighborhood" you should take notes. I know the New Germany is getting richer and richer, nevertheless this book illustrates why, when it comes to fashion, the world still does not look to Germany.
